The Origins of Earth Day

April 22 marked the 52nd anniversary of Earth Day. What began as a uniquely American event in 1970 will be celebrated throughout the world. Given the undeniable threat to the planet—and of course to our lives and those of our loved ones—the international scope is quite fitting.

What led to the creation of Earth Day? It seems it was a culmination of concerns that were first described by Rachel Carson in her 1962 ground breaking book, “Silent Spring,” which sold half a million copies in 24 countries. Sensitivity to pollution problems grew until, in 1969, a disastrous oil spill off Santa Barbara ravaged that California coast.

One of the observers of the Santa Barbara calamity was Democratic U.S. Senator Gaylord Nelson of Wisconsin. Prior to his election to the Senate in 1962, Nelson had served two terms as Governor of Wisconsin. Coming from a rural part of the state, he always appreciated its beauty. While campaigning he became aware of the Wisconsin citizenry’s concern for waterway pollution and other environmental degradations, and after taking office he acted vigorously to take corrective action. He was so successful, that he became known as “The Conservation Governor.”

After his election to the Senate, he remained committed to preserving the environment, assisting President Kennedy in this area of his administration’s program.

After Nelson witnessed the devastation wrought by the Santa Barbara spill, he reached out to California Republican Congressman Pete McCloskey. In an admirable example of bipartisanship—so desperately needed today—the two conceived the idea of Earth Day. They were not interested in creating a formal top-down type organization, but were inspired by the example of so much spontaneous activity



among young people fighting against the Vietnam War and for civil rights that they decided the celebration should arise from the grassroots. They reached out to a young activist by the name of Dennis Hayes and gave him the job of building that grassroots movement. He was so successful that on that first Earth Day, 20 million people turned out to demonstrate and commit to environmental activism. Hayes went on to found the Earth Day Network and expanded it to 180 nations.

Meanwhile, Congress had been considering legislation introduced in 1969 by Senator Henry “Scoop” Jackson, Democrat of Washington State, known as the Environmental Protection Act. It passed overwhelmingly in the Senate and House near the end of 1969 and was signed into law by President Nixon on January 1, 1970. There is little doubt that the nationwide activity to establish Earth Day had a positive impact on the politics of enacting this important law. And from that new law sprang numerous initiatives dealing with all sorts of environmental hazards.

Senator Nelson summed up his view of the environment with these words: “Environment is all of America and its problems. It is rats in the ghetto. It is a hungry child in a land of

LIVING OUR MISSION

Alleluia! Alleluia!

He is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia! Alleluia! Upon entering the Church we are greeted with the beautiful and tall Paschal candle, lilies, and gold and white banners. Something very significant has taken place, obviously.

Since Palm Sunday we have experienced yet again the great Paschal Mystery - the dying and rising of Our Lord. As we, the Body of Christ, take time to reflect on that mystery, on what we have lived over since April 10, remember your experiences:

Palm Sunday and the procession from Trinity Hall to the Church, ending in silence, signaling the approaching of the holiest of weeks; The Evening Mass of the Lord's Supper and the many people who did as Jesus did: wash one another's feet; The Good Friday of the Lord's Passion service beginning in silence, Marie's powerful proclamation of the Passion, veneration of the Cross, again ending in silence; The Great Vigil on Saturday with the blessing of the fire and candle, procession to the Church in darkness, Fr. Bill chanting the Exultet, the readings telling the story of our history, procession of the Elect to the font, the Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist as Patrick, Anina, Ronald, Carolyn, Mihwa, Tristan and Frank became our newest members of the Church; And, finally, Easter Sunday! Every pew, the choir loft, every added chair, Trinity Hall and even the cafeteria were filled with the Body of Christ!

Alleluia! Alleluia!

We have 50 days to celebrate this season of transformation and conversion. How will you journey through this Easter Season? We will be learning a new song during this Easter Season, "Be My Hands and Feet," which will highlight how we, as Body of Christ, take up our gospel mission to feed the hungry, to love and serve without distinction...

A practice to explore this Easter Season is Lectio Divina (Latin for "sacred reading"). The readings for the following Sunday will be listed in the worship aid each week. Take a picture of the readings on your phone and consider looking up the readings, taking time to sit, pray and listen to what they are saying to you throughout the week. As you attend Mass next Sunday, these words from the Bible will already be a part of your conversion and transformation. Fr. Daniel J. Harrington, S.J. suggests using these four prayerful questions: First, ask, "What does the text say?" or "What is going on?" Second, ask, "What does the text say to me?" or "What relevance does the passage have for our daily lives?" Third, "What do I want to say to God about this text?" Begin an honest conversation with God. Fourth, "What difference will this text make in my life?"

So, I hope you are having a most blessed and joy-filled Easter Season!

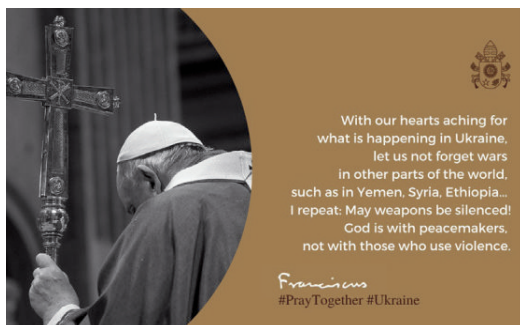

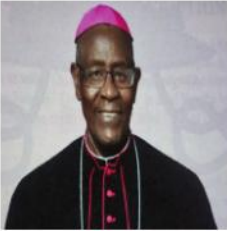
LGBTQIA+ MINISTRY

Welcome Bishop Jerome Feudjio!

Today we welcome the Very Rev. Bishop Jerome Feudjio of the Catholic Diocese of St. Thomas in the Virgin Islands. Bishop Feudjio was born and raised in Cameroon, entering religious life at 17 as a postulant for the Congregation of the Fathers of the Sacred Heart.

While still in formation in 1980, Bishop Feudjio traveled to the United States, where he met the then Fr. Seán O'Malley, who invited him to stay and study in Washington, D.C. Feudjio completed his studies in philosophy and theology in the Archdiocese of Washington at Oblate College. He also holds advanced degrees in Social Justice and Rehabilitative Administration from Southern Illinois University. Before being named Bishop by Pope Francis in March of last year, he served within the Diocese of St. Thomas for 30 years.

affluence. It is housing not worthy of the name; neighborhoods not fit to inhabit.” There is little doubt that Nelson and those who gave us Earth Day would have recognized global warming, plastic pollution, and the still-in-existence, lead water pipes as existential threats needing strong and sustained action. Let us pray that we will see more and more action at the grassroots level to deal with these threats, and that more and more decision makers—both public and private—DECIDE to take the very overdue action necessary to protect us.

As Pope Francis wrote in LAUDATO SI: *“Bring healing to our lives, that we may protect the world and not prey on it. That we may sow beauty, not pollution and destruction...”*

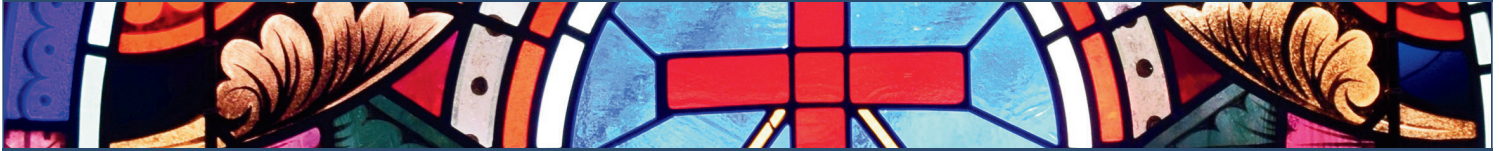
