Our Journey to Racial Healing

Members of Restorative Justice Racial Healing Circle Groups from Holy Trinity Catholic Church, John Wesley AME Zion Church, and St Augustine Catholic Church gathered this past fall at Holy Rood Cemetery in Georgetown for a service to honor the buried enslaved.

Fr. Kevin Gillespie, S.J. of Holy Trinity presided, proclaiming, “We meet together in celebration, fellowship, and thanksgiving for the grace of God who has brought us together and inspired our work together to combat racism in our society.”

Members of the Circle groups gathered at the “Free Burial Ground,” where enslaved Black parishioners and poor whites were buried, to read scripture passages and sing hymns. A central feature of the gathering was to “recall, remember, and acknowledge the dignity in death denied them in life” of thirty-eight of the buried enslaved by calling out their names as recorded in Holy Trinity Burial records.

The group prayed for the enslaved deceased members and their descendants, deceased Circle members, and deceased family members of the Circle Groups – and concluded by joining together to sing the hymn Lift Every Voice and Sing. Afterward the group shared fellowship, snacks, and beverages in McKenna Hall at Holy Trinity.

Restorative Justice deals with the impact of harm on the person harmed, the perpetrator of the harm, and the larger community. Restorative Justice uses the Circle format to bring healing and wholeness to people affected by harm. A Circle is a versatile restorative practice that can be used proactively to develop relationships and build community. Circles give people an opportunity to speak and listen to one another in an atmosphere of safety, decorum, equality and confidentiality.

For the last three years, members of the Holy Trinity Restorative Justice Ministry have held biweekly Racial Justice Healing Circles with members of two Black churches in Washington DC, John Wesley African American Methodist Episcopal Zion Church and St. Augustine Catholic Church. In Circle, the members have engaged in frank and, on occasion, painful discussions of experiences with racism and through the intensity, community has begun to form among the members.

This January 16 will be the National Day of Racial Healing. In honor of that occasion we will have a Zoom discussion, *“What If.. we could all share a journey to Racial Healing?”* at 10 AM on Saturday January 20. LARGE GRANT FOCUS: VIOLENCE PREVENTION IN YOUTH

2023-24 marks the 40th year that Holy Trinity Catholic Church has set aside a percentage of its income to address social justice concerns within the Archdiocese of the District of Columbia and beyond. The Tithe Program seeks to address root causes of social justice issues across the DMV. In 2014, Holy Trinity began allocating a tithe portion to larger social justice grants (>\$20,000) focusing on a priority theme identified each year. These grants have supported social justice work by addressing issues systemically or by making investments to help sustain service and advocacy-oriented work. The 2024 RFP focuses on the following priority theme: violence prevention in youth. We also evaluate small grant requests that address food insecurity, migration/refugees, the environment, homelessness, returning citizens, advocacy and youth. In 2024, we are also interested in projects that address mental health in teens and environmental advocacy. 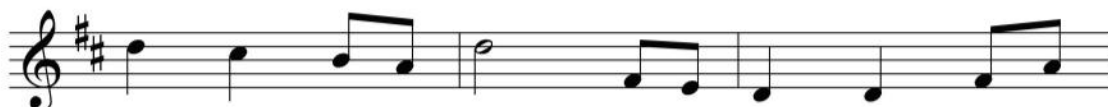

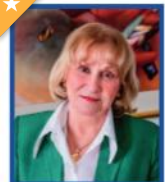
